





In Joy and Sorrow PONDERING TOGETHER THE TREASURES OF OUR FAITH

In my ministry as a priest-pastor (servant leader), the single most important thing I do every week is to prepare for the celebration of the Mass on the weekends. I want you to know that I do not take any shortcuts in my weekly process of preparation for the celebration of the Mass. I begin already on Sunday evening, or at the latest Monday morning, pondering the Scripture readings for the following weekend. I pray these Scriptures during the week. I read them again and again. My activities for the whole week are lived in the shadow of these Scriptures. I read commentaries on the Gospel so that I have an informed understanding of the "bigger picture" in which it was written: the culture of the people of the time, the audience addressed, and the issues confronting the early Christian community. On Saturday morning, I sit at my laptop and type out my homily. I am a firm believer in preparing a text for my homily. I am reminded of the former Archbishop of Chicago, Cardinal Joseph Bernardin (a mentor that I admire very much!), who always wrote out his homilies.

Last weekend, the gist of my homily for the Feast of the Epiphany was that there are no barriers or boundaries in the heart of Jesus. In the heart of Jesus, there is no discrimination, prejudice, racism, or sexism. Jesus' precious gift of salvation is extended to all peoples in every nation. More important than the star of long ago and even the torch of Lady Liberty today, is that you and I are bearers of the light of Jesus. What is in our hearts should match what is in the heart of Jesus. Compassion, sensitivity and respect must be the hallmarks of our Christian lives. All of these points were in my prepared homily.

Sometimes something comes over me and I embellish on my prepared remarks. I speak off-the-cuff, if you will. This can sometimes prove to be problematic because those remarks are not as carefully spoken. In speaking of the Catholic Church's relationship to other Christian Churches and to non-Christian religions (including Judaism, Islam, Buddhism, and others), I should have been more careful in how I made the points first suggested in the Documents of Vatican Council II, especially in The Relation of the Church to Non-Christian Religions (Nostra Aetate) [In our time]. I should have said that the fullness of truth subsists (or resides or can be found) only in the Catholic Church. But something very new was introduced in Nostra Aetate that declared that pieces of the truth can be found in other non-Christian religions. Quoting from this beautiful document, which was proclaimed by Blessed Pope Paul VI fifty years ago this past October, are these incredible lines: "The Catholic Church rejects nothing that is true and holy in these religions. She regards with sincere reverence those ways of conduct and of life, those precepts and teachings which, though differing in many aspects from the ones she holds and sets forth, nonetheless often reflect a ray of that Truth which enlightens all men. Indeed, she proclaims, and ever must proclaim Christ 'the way, the truth, and the life" (John 14:6), in whom men may find the fullness of religious life, in whom God has reconciled all things to Himself."

The fact that for centuries the Church taught that there was no salvation outside of the Church (Ask your grandparents if this is so!) was changed by Vatican Council II. The gift of salvation always comes through Jesus and how Jesus might save even non-Christians is deep in his heart and may be beyond our capacity to understand. I do believe that this was something new! Now some may chose to disagree with this interpretation and even Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI and Pope Francis might have an engaging conversation about the interpretation of Vatican Council II.

We are Catholic Christians, and proud of that fact, not because we have been coerced somehow into to believing that there is no truth elsewhere or that we cannot be saved elsewhere. We are Catholic Christians because we are enthralled by the gift of the Sacraments - especially the gift of the risen Jesus really present in His Most Precious Body and Blood at every Mass. It all comes back to that personal relationship with Jesus, who can bring us salvation. We have a responsibility to pass on to our children the riches of our faith in a way that encourages them to grow in a reverence for what makes us Catholic. In all of our relationships with non-Catholics and non-Christians, we must always propose and never impose. We must always listen with great respect.


