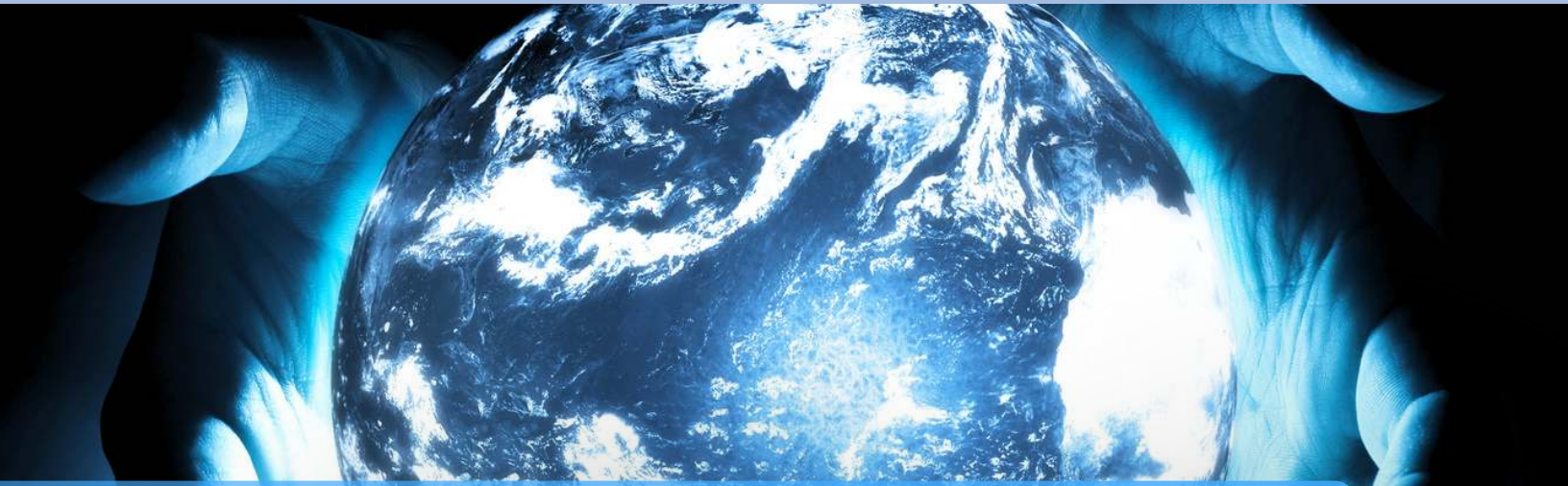

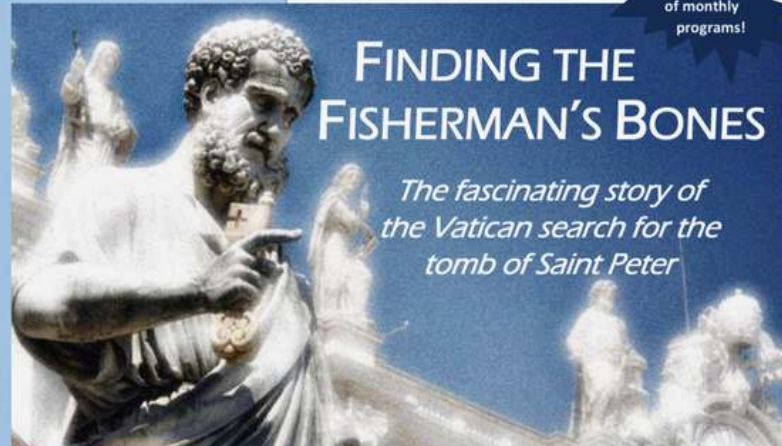
As part of Gratitude & Giving Month we are bringing back a couple pre-covid practices.

# in Joy & SORROW



Two anniversaries that may inspire our prayer in the month of November are the anniversary of the death of Cardinal Joseph Bernardin, Archbishop of Chicago, on November 14, 1996 and the anniversary of the deaths of the Holy Martyrs of El Salvador on November 16, 1989.

Throughout my priestly ministry, I have tried to imbibe the teaching and example of Cardinal Bernardin. When he was appointed the new Archbishop of Chicago in 1982, he introduced himself so humbly to his new flock, "I am Joseph, your brother."

One of the most poignant stories in the history of our Jewish ancestors in the faith is the story of Joseph and his eleven brothers. How jealous the ten were of Joseph's close relationship with their father, Jacob! (The youngest brother, Benjamin, had not yet been born.) So envious were they that, convinced by their oldest brother, Reuben,

that murdering Joseph would be going too far, they sold Joseph into slavery, creating a false story that Joseph was killed by vicious animals, casting their dear father into inconsolable grief.

Rescued from the pit of an empty well by wandering nomads, Joseph went on to become the second most powerful person in Egypt. During a worldwide famine, he was in charge of the equal distribution of grain to the hungry of Egypt and throughout the world. His brothers came seeking aid; Joseph listened to them, under the disguise of needing a translator; and finally, heartbreakingly, revealed himself, "I am Joseph, your brother." Cue: No dry eyes anywhere in the palace! (Genesis chapters 37, 42-45)

I often refer back to the Cardinal's insight that all of the life issues are interwoven, like the crucified Jesus' seamless outer garment which could not be torn into tiny mementos for the Roman soldiers to take home from Calvary.

Beginning in the womb and all the way to natural death, the human person has great dignity and nothing must be allowed to strip away that dignity. Without diminishing the evil of abortion in any way, the life issues of capital punishment, nuclear armament, gun violence, climate change, racism, homophobia and transphobia, poverty, adequate health care for all, a broken immigration system, and discrimination against those of different religions need our prayer and courageous commitment to address. This consistent approach is what is meant by being pro-life.

Pope Leo recently said, "Someone who says, 'I'm against abortion but says I'm in favor of the death penalty' is not really pro-life. So someone who says that 'I'm against abortion, but I'm in agreement with the inhumane treatment of immigrants who are in the United States,' I don't know if that's pro-life." (10/7/2025, in an interview outside Castel Gandolfo)

Cardinal Bernardin would have given his assent to these comments from Pope Leo. The notion of a consistent ethic of life, introduced by Bernardin in 1983, received a lot of push back from his fellow US Cardinals at the time. It is still resisted today by Church leaders and people who believe that abortion is the only pro-life issue that has weight. I respectfully disagree.

A gem on my bookshelf is Cardinal Bernardin's last will and testament, his little book titled [The Gift of Peace](#). It is the story of this good Shepherd's struggles because of a false accusation of sexual abuse against him as well as a terminal diagnosis of pancreatic cancer. A willingness to carry the cross of suffering always makes one holy. This little book is an unrefutable testimony to that.

Bearing the cross of giving witness to what is right and just, in the midst of an oppressive government, led to the martyrdom of Father Ignacio Ellacuria and his five Jesuit priest companions, as well as their housekeeper and the housekeeper's daughter. The government of El Salvador, where all power was concentrated, refused to allow the poor people of that land to live in joy, treated with the sacred dignity that God had given them. These courageous priests spoke out on their behalf as more and more of the precious land was monopolized by the rich and powerful.

Beautiful in Catholic Social Teaching is the preferential option for the poor. The Lord has a special love for our sisters and brothers who are marginalized and find themselves tossed to the curb as if their lives are garbage. Jesus reminded us that our poor brothers and sisters are blessed. Their trust in the Lord in the midst of unimaginable hardships is almost incomprehensible to many of us. The poor are truly holy.

Imagine what it must be like for our immigrant sisters and brothers to be held in a detention center, separated from a spouse and family, the future uncertain, certain though that you have committed no crime, while living here for decades, other than being undocumented, living in difficult circumstances where the quality of food is questionable and basic hygiene is difficult, denied even visits from your family and your faith community. Between 50% and 60% of immigrants in the US are Catholic.

There is a soul sickness in our nation that somehow sees this treatment of human beings as justified.

Father Ellacuria and his companions would be quick to speak out today against this inhumane sin! Let us ask them to pray for our immigrant sisters and brothers, those who are officials of ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement), and our nation. May we embrace again our better angels of compassion and justice for all.
