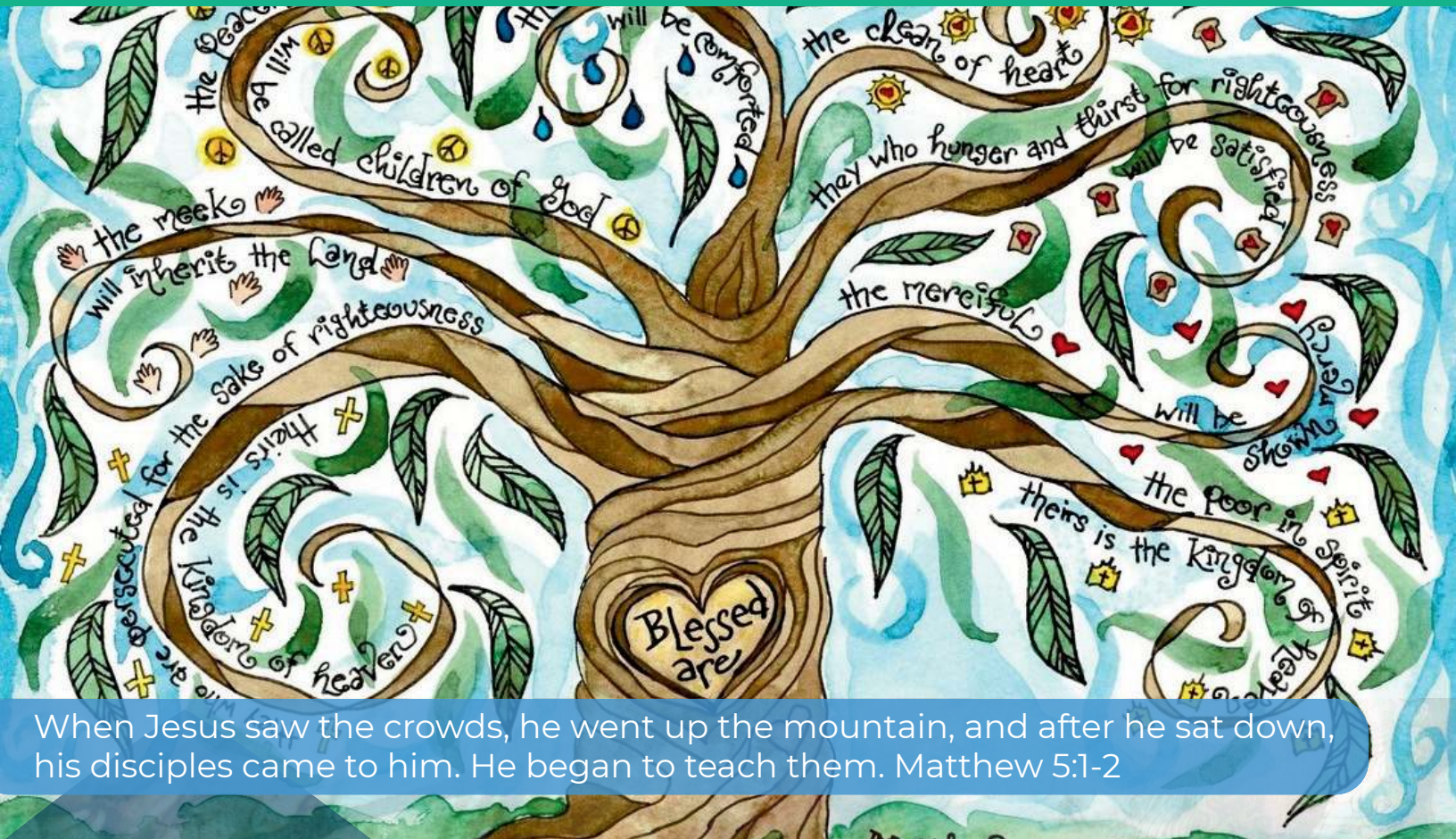

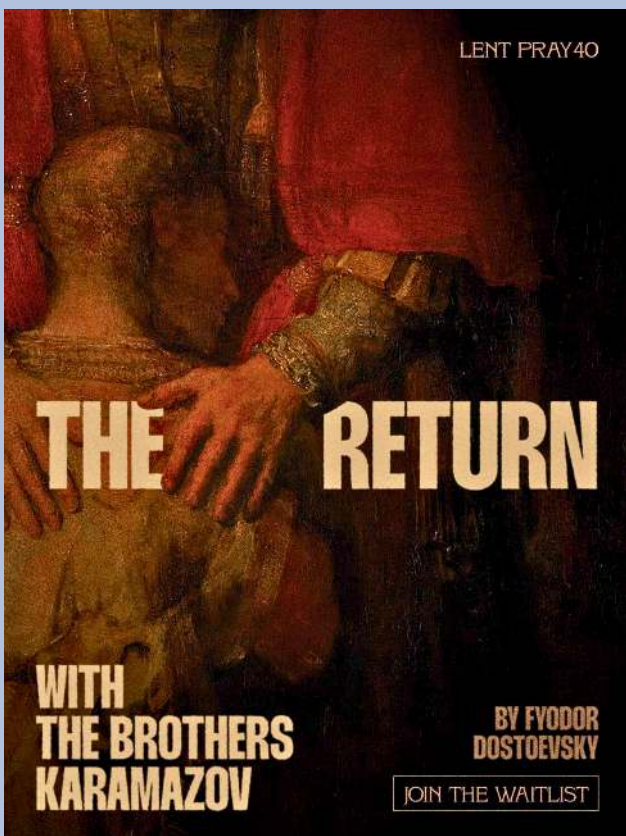

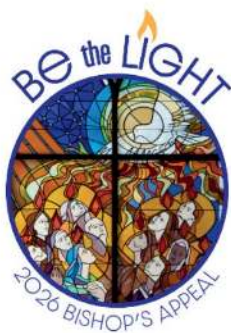

# *in Joy &* **SORROW**

ST MARY PARISH - APPLETON // 2.1.2026  
WITH FR. BILL SWICHTENBERG



I am suffering from compassion fatigue. My heart is overwhelmed by all that is battering our nation and the values that we have always held sacred, as enshrined in our Declaration of Independence and our Constitution. These are dark, cold and bleak times. I cannot imagine what it would feel like for us in Appleton and beyond if we woke up tomorrow and there were a significant number of ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) agents in our midst. The fear would be immediate and palpable. Our immigrant sisters and brothers would be terrified. I am certain that some of the ICE agents would be afraid, too, struggling with what they have been asked to do.

How tired and angry and heartbroken are our sisters and brothers of Minneapolis on these grotesque days. Too many of them have witnessed firsthand the horrific end of the lives of Renee Nicole Good and Alex Jeffrey Pretti.

We can all agree that nobody wants to see the lives of two 37-year-old adults snuffed out so tragically. We want, too, to be apprised of the truth of what happened, as revealed in a detailed report from an independent criminal investigative team, which includes MN's investigative agencies. Conclusions made without an official and unbiased investigation are uncalled for and border on being lies and complete fabrications. How can you and I be asked to believe something that our own eyes and ears contradict! We are headed in a dangerous direction if we are coerced by our government to override what we actually see and hear! What an inconceivable cruelty it is to slander the memory of Renee and Alex, which just heaps more heartache upon their families and friends.

It is the truth that will set us free. For too long we have been exposed to alternative truth (which seems an oxymoron to me!) and have become numb to the lies that have been disproven by reputable sources. Leaders who are chronic liars are dangerous to our future. We need to seek out the truth and hold people accountable for their twisting of that truth.

The death of a human being is irrevocable. Not one of us can turn back the clock. Because every human being is precious to the Lord and created in His Image and Likeness, we cannot just move on without honoring those tragic deaths with the truth. Every person in law enforcement knows that every fatal shooting of a human being is either justifiable or not. An investigation determines that fact and people are held accountable for unjustifiable occurrences. The officers involved in the death of George Floyd of Minneapolis now know that from their prison cells.

A real living person, Jesus Himself, is the truth. So we who follow Jesus must look to His words and His deeds to see what truth looks like. Jesus had a big, wide open heart which took delight in every person, especially lepers, prostitutes, tax collectors, those who were hungry and thirsty, or sick and in prison, and even great sinners. Jesus embraced strangers and welcomed them into his heart. We can do no less.

The great Lutheran Pastor, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, who was executed for speaking out against the hatred and violence which Hitler's thugs spewed upon holy Jewish people, gay people, and political opponents during WWII, said this: "Silence in the face of evil is itself evil."

As disciples of Jesus, we can no longer remain silent!

Rare in the history of the papacy is the occasion when a Pope writes specifically to the body of Catholic Bishops in a particular country where an injustice is being inflicted on its people. Pope Francis did exactly that on February 10, 2025, when he expressed his concern about indiscriminate mass deportation in the US. It would do you good to pray over his entire letter.

Here are paragraphs 4 and 5, which I feel are courageously prophetic:

*I have closely followed the major crisis that is taking place in the United States with the initiation of a program of mass deportations. The rightly formed conscience cannot fail to make a critical judgment and express its disagreement with any measure that tacitly or explicitly identifies the illegal status of some migrants with criminality. At the same time, one must recognize the right of a nation to defend itself and keep communities safe from those who have committed violent or serious crimes while in the country or prior to arrival. That said, the act of deporting people who in many cases have left their own land for reasons of extreme poverty, insecurity, exploitation, persecution or serious deterioration of the environment, damages the dignity of many men and women, and of entire families, and places them in a state of particular vulnerability and defenselessness.*

*This is not a minor issue: an authentic rule of law is verified precisely in the dignified treatment that all people deserve, especially the poorest and most marginalized. The true common good is promoted when society and government, with creativity and strict respect for the rights of all — as I have affirmed on numerous occasions — welcomes, protects, promotes and integrates the most fragile, unprotected and vulnerable. This does not impede the development of a policy that regulates orderly and legal migration. However, this development cannot come about through the privilege of some and the sacrifice of others. What is built on the basis of force, and not on the truth about the equal dignity of every human being, begins badly and will end badly.*

Thanks for sticking with me to the end of this **IN JOY AND SORROW.**

Finally, another letter that brought tears to my eyes.

From Jessica Hauser:

*I was Alex Pretti's final nursing student. [Alex lost his life in an altercation with ICE agents in Minneapolis on Saturday, Jan 24.] He was my friend and my nursing mentor. For the past four months, I stood shoulder to shoulder with him during my capstone preceptorship at the Minneapolis VA hospital. There he trained me to care for the sickest of the sick as an ICU nurse. He taught me how to care for arterial and central lines, the intricacies of managing multiple IVs filled with life-saving solutions, and how to watch over every heartbeat, every breath, and every flicker of life ready to act at the moment they wavered. Techniques intended to heal. Alex carried patience, compassion and calm as a steady light within him. Even at the very end, that light was there. I recognized his familiar stillness and signature calm shining through during those unbearable final moments captured on camera. It does not surprise me that his final words were, "Are you OK?" [as he was helping a woman to get up who was shoved to the ground by ICE agents.] Caring for people was at the core of who he was. He was incapable of causing harm. He lived a life of healing, and he lived it well. Alex believed strongly in the Second Amendment [the right to keep and bear arms] and in the rights rooted in our Constitution and its amendments. He spoke out for justice and peace whenever he could, not only out of obligation, but out of a belief that we are more connected than divided, and that communication would bring us together. I want his family to know his legacy lives on. I am a better nurse because of the wisdom and skills he instilled in me. I carry his light with me into every room, letting it guide and steady my hands as I heal and care for those in need. Please honor my friend by standing up for peace, preferably with a cup of black coffee in hand and a couple of pieces of candy in your pocket, just as he would. He would remind you that caring for others is hard work, and we must do whatever it takes to get through the long shifts. Step outside with your dog, breathe in the world, hike or bike as he loved to do, and let yourself find peace in the quiet moments within nature. Stand up for justice and speak with those whose views differ from your own. Hold your beliefs with strength, but always extend love outward, even in the face of adversity. Take one step, no matter how small to help heal our world. Through these acts, carry his light forward in his name. Let his legacy continue to heal.*

Eternal rest grant unto Renee and Alex of Minneapolis! Lord, may your perpetual light shine upon them! Comfort their heartbroken families and friends and heal our hurting nation!
