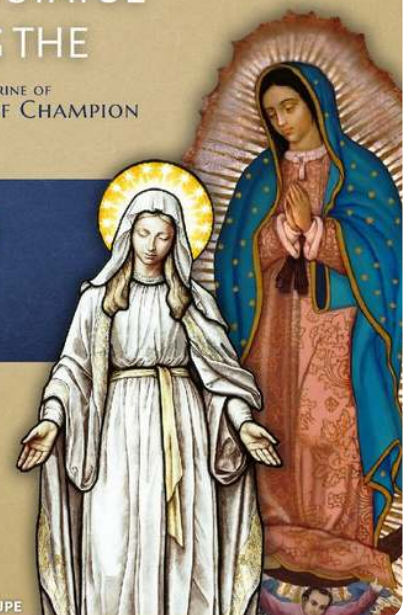

I am motivated to look closer whenever there is a new development in the Church's understanding of theology, ecclesiology, liturgy, or whatever other discipline might present itself.

For decades the experience of bringing unbaptized persons or persons baptized into another Christian faith into the Catholic Church was named The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. I remember that Sister Joanne was determined to react against calling the RCIA a program. No way! It was a process that prepared catechumens (the unbaptized) and candidates (baptized Protestant) for the Easter Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist. It was more than the handing on of knowledge about the faith. The RCIA process also engaged the hearts of the Elect to fall more deeply in love with the Lord and engaged their hands to reach out in humble service to others.

Within the last couple of years, there has been a name change for this experience. The RCIA is now the OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults). The difference between *Rite* and *Order* may be nuanced but I think it has to do with emphasizing the process nature of the entire journey to full communion in the Catholic Church. The word *Rite* seems to have a narrower sense to it.

In the Early Church, the journey to full membership in the Church took place over the course of three years or more. Those persons yearning for something more in their lives were encouraged to look closely at their lifestyles, to scrutinize their behaviors and attitudes, and to begin to make choices that turned their lives to faith and hope in the Lord Jesus, and to love of Him. To be a gladiator in the Roman Coliseum, training to do battle to the death with a worthy opponent, was contrary to the Christian Gospel. Certainly to make a living in prostitution was frowned upon. To be an adulterer would require a change of heart and lifestyle which did not happen overnight.

A closer look at the signs of the times suggests the following historical reasons for an extended period of formation for seekers (A shout out to Nadine, our OCIA catechist, for this information!):

- *Combating Heresy*: The 4th century saw massive debates, specifically the Arian controversy, questioning Christ's divinity. To counter this, bishops mandated detailed, long-term instruction to ensure new members understood the nuances of the Trinitarian faith.
- *Quality Control*: With Christianity becoming favored by the state, many sought baptism for social or political reasons rather than conviction. The often lasting, three-year, or even longer, catechumenate period allowed the church to vet the sincerity of converts.
- *The Postponement of Baptism*: Since the Sacrament of Confession was not established until the Middle Ages and the forgiveness of sins happened only once at Baptism, by the 300s, it became common practice to delay baptism, with many, including Emperor Constantine, waiting until the end of their lives. This resulted in a large, extended class of "catechumens" (learners) who were under instruction for long periods.

When ready for a more proximal preparation, which would bring the Elect to the celebration of the Easter Sacraments in the night of Holy Saturday at the Easter Vigil, there were moments when the Creed and the Our Father were entrusted to the Elect, when they were presented for the formal Rites of Scrutiny, and when they celebrated Reconciliation (Confession/Penance) for the first time. The journey was not isolated but occurred among others being received into the Church, as well as being a part of the

Sunday worshipping assembly until the moment of dismissal after the homily. Hopefully, some of this sounds familiar to you as these rites were restored when the RCIA was implemented.

There are some nuances recently that have fine-tuned the experience, notably at the Easter Vigil. The Easter Vigil is now reserved only for those who are unbaptized, and who will receive the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist.) At the Easter Vigil this year at Saint Mary, no unbaptized persons have presented themselves. This year we do have, however, Joey and Jeff, two young men, who are baptized, but will receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at a time other than the Easter Vigil. As pastor, I will have the faculty to administer those Confirmations.

We usually think of the Bishop as the presider of Confirmation and this must be so when the candidate has been baptized and received Holy Communion in the Catholic Church. It would be a rare occurrence that a priest would have permission to confirm in this instance.

Joey and Jeff will receive the graces of Confirmation and Eucharist, hopefully, at a Sunday Mass, sometime during the Easter Season, which is fifty days long. Interestingly and counterintuitively, if we would be celebrating Baptism at the Easter Vigil this year, then Joey and Jeff could have been confirmed at that service. Because the Easter Vigil is so closely connected to the actual celebration of Baptism, that is, the sign of the pouring of the holy water, invoking the Holy Trinity, and which includes the Renewal of Baptismal Promises on the part of the whole assembly, the reception of Confirmation and Eucharist for those baptized in another Christian tradition and intending to become Catholic, linked in this instance to the celebration of Baptism, can occur at the Vigil. Now that you are completely confused, so am I!

Throughout Lent, it does us good to pray for our brothers in our parish family, Joey and Jeff, as well as our sisters and brothers in Appleton, and throughout our nation and world who are joining the Catholic Church this Easter.

Let us pray:

Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, our Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier, Holy Trinity, it is in Your Divine Nature to always reach out of Yourself, drawing all people into the Heart of Your Divine Love. You increase Your Church so that believers everywhere may be Your Disciples, commanded to go out into the world, building up Your Kingdom of Love and Joy, Justice and Peace. Bless our Elect near and far on these holy Lenten days. Fold Your Sacred Heart around their hearts. Speak softly that they may hear that they are Your Beloved, in whom you take delight. Write Your Gospel boldly upon their hearts and send them into their new parish spiritual families and into their families, places of work and communities as new radiant lights of Your Love for all people. Amen!
