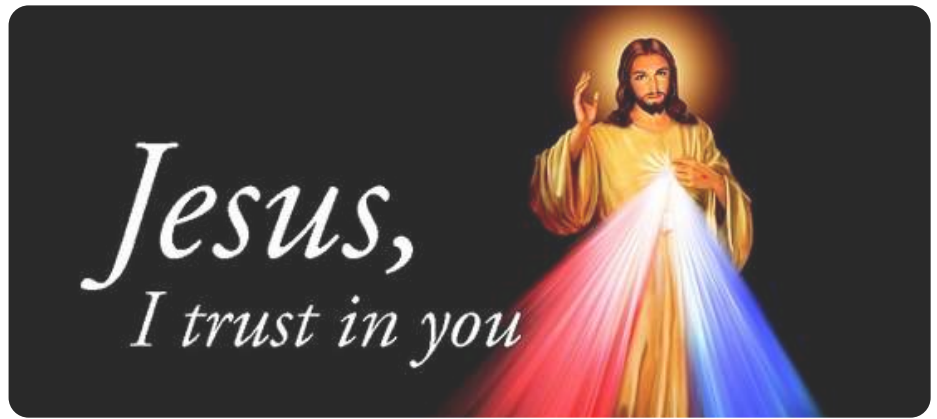

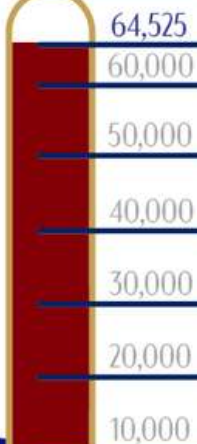

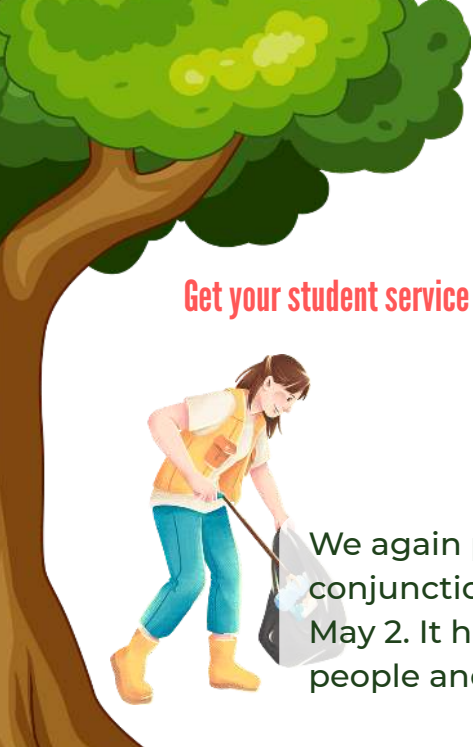

In his first celebration of the Sacred Triduum, Pope Leo showed the world that he is a man who still has great stamina at the age of 70.

The Holy Father decided that he would return to the Basilica of Saint John Lateran, the Cathedral Church of the Diocese of Rome, for the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday evening. You might recall that for thirteen years, Pope Francis travelled outside of the Vatican for this Mass. He often chose a prison to visit on Holy Thursday evening. I am guessing that Pope Leo wanted for this Mass to be more public; he wanted to gather the priests of Rome around him; and to highlight the link between the Eucharist and the Priesthood, he desired to wash the feet of 12 priests, ten of whom he had ordained when he was Cardinal Prevost. All fine with me. I am sensing more and more that Pope Leo is his own person. His leadership style is different from Pope Francis'. This observation should not surprise anyone. The uniqueness of each of our 266 Successors to Saint Peter is a gift of the Holy Spirit to the Church!

As a preacher, Pope Leo is precise and deliberate. He rarely goes off of the script of his prepared homily. I find his messages to be poignant and his "turn of phrase" to be engaging. Here is just a bit of his Holy Thursday homily:

"Let us, then, learn from Jesus this reciprocal service. He does not ask us to repay him, but to share his gift among ourselves: You also ought to wash one another's feet" (John 13:14).

“Let us, then, learn from Jesus this reciprocal service. He does not ask us to repay him, but to share his gift among ourselves: *You also ought to wash one another’s feet*” (John 13:14). As Pope Francis once remarked: *this is a duty which comes from my heart: I love it. I love this and I love to do it because that is what the Lord has taught me to do* (**Homily at Mass of the Lord’s Supper, 28 March 2013**). He was not speaking of an abstract imperative, nor of a formal and empty command, but expressing his heartfelt obedience to the charity of Christ, which is both the source and the model of our own charity. Indeed, the example given by Jesus cannot be imitated out of convenience, reluctance or hypocrisy, but only out of love.”

“Allowing ourselves to be served by the Lord is therefore the necessary condition for serving as he did. *Unless I wash you*, Jesus said to Peter, *you have no share in me* (John 13:8): unless you accept me as your servant, you cannot truly believe in me or follow me as Lord. By washing our bodies, Jesus purifies our souls. In him, God has given us an example — not of how to dominate, but of how to liberate; not of how to destroy life, but of how to give it.”

At the Commemoration of the Passion and Death of the Lord on Good Friday at Saint Peter’s Basilica, it is the custom that the Pope does not preach. Rather this holy task fell to the Papal Preacher, Father Robert Pasolini, OFM Cap. I have only read summaries of Father’s homily. He chose to call attention to the Prophet Isaiah’s Four Suffering Servant Songs. Father suggested, “Jesus is the man of sorrows who knows suffering well — no violence, no resort to force, no temptation to destroy everything and start over from scratch. We know how difficult it is to embrace such a mission. We are tempted to use aggression and violence, thinking that without them nothing can ever be resolved. But only meekness is the true strength for confronting the darkness of evil.”

On Good Friday evening, Pope Leo led the Stations of the Cross at the Roman Colosseum. You and I probably do not remember the names of the brutal Roman Emperors who decreed the horrible torture and deaths of the first Christians in that amphitheater. But since 1964, the Church has lifted high the Cross of Jesus in that place of brutality and murder to say, “O Death, where is your sting?” Pope Leo lifted the Cross high, carrying it throughout the stadium, stopping at each of the stations. He carried within his heart the suffering of too many of our sisters and brothers throughout the world. The last time a Pope carried the cross like Leo was during the ministry of Saint Pope John Paul II in the 1980’s.

The meditations for the Stations of the Cross were written by another Franciscan friar, Father Francesco Patton, who served for a number of years in the Holy Land. The Franciscans for many years have overseen the Christian Holy Places in Jerusalem and beyond. These meditations are powerful. The Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday evening at Saint Peter's Basilica was over three hours long. Pope Leo welcomed ten people into the Catholic Church from different parts of the world through the Waters of Baptism, the Chrism of Confirmation, and the Precious Body and Blood of Jesus at the Eucharistic Table.

Here is just a snippet of his homily:

"As humanity is brought to its knees by so many acts of brutality, let us too kneel down as brothers and sisters alongside the oppressed. In this way, we seek to follow the Lord's example, fulfilling what we have heard from the book of Exodus: *This day shall be a day of remembrance for you (12:14)*. Indeed, the whole of biblical history converges in Jesus, the true Passover lamb. In him, the ancient figures find their fulfillment, for Christ the Savior accomplishes the Passover of humanity, opening for all the passage from sin to forgiveness, from death to eternal life: *This is my body which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me (1 Corinthians 11:24)*."

"Sisters and brothers, even today there are tombs to be opened, and often the stones sealing them are so heavy and so closely guarded that they seem to be immovable. Some weigh heavily on the human heart, such as mistrust, fear, selfishness and resentment; others, stemming from these inner struggles, sever the bonds between us through war, injustice and the isolation of peoples and nations. Let us not allow ourselves to be paralyzed by them! Over the centuries, many men and women, with God's help, have rolled them away — perhaps with great effort, sometimes at the cost of their lives — but with good fruits that we still benefit from today. They are not unattainable figures, but people like us who, strengthened by the grace of the Risen One, in charity and truth, had the courage to speak, as the Apostle Peter says, the *very words of God (1 Peter 4:11) and to act with the strength that God supplies, so that God may be glorified (1 Peter 4:11)*."

"Let us be inspired by their example, and on this Holy Night let us make their commitment our own, so that the Easter gifts of harmony and peace may grow and flourish everywhere and always throughout the world. From without, death is always lurking. We see it present in injustices, in partisan selfishness, in the oppression of the poor, in the lack of attention given to the most vulnerable. We see it in violence, in the wounds of the world, in the cry of pain that rises from every corner because of the abuses that crush the weakest among us, because of the idolatry of profit that plunders the earth's resources, because of the violence of war that kills and destroys."

"In this reality, the Passover of the Lord invites us to lift our gaze and open our hearts. It continues to nourish the seed of the promised victory within our spirit and throughout the course of history. It sets us in motion, like Mary Magdalene and the Apostles, so that we may discover that Jesus' tomb is empty, and therefore in every death we experience

there is also room for new life to arise. The Lord is alive and remains with us. Through the cracks of resurrection that open up in the darkness, he entrusts our hearts to the hope that sustains us: the power of death is not the final destiny of our lives. We are all directed, once and for all, on the path to fulfillment, because in Christ we also have risen.”

“With heartfelt words, Pope Francis reminded us of this in his first Apostolic Exhortation, **Evangelii Gaudium**, affirming that the resurrection of Christ *is not an event of the past; it contains a vital power which has permeated this world. Where all seems to be dead, signs of the resurrection suddenly spring up. It is an irresistible force. Often it seems that God does not exist: all around us we see persistent injustice, evil, indifference and cruelty. But it is also true that in the midst of darkness something new always springs to life and sooner or later produces fruit (no. 276).*”

On Easter Sunday morning, Pope Leo presided over a morning outdoor Mass in St Peter’s Square for about 50,000 people. He also delivered his Easter Message to the City of Rome and the World (Urbi et Orbi Blessing).

I am a huge believer that Catholics everywhere should keep abreast of the ministry of the Pope. Right now, in this messed-up world of ours, Pope Leo is the most revered of all world leaders. His messages speak truth to power and challenge us to let Jesus and His Gospel shape all of our thoughts, words and actions.

Please keep Pope Leo in your prayers as he leaves on Monday (4/13) for a ten-day Pastoral Visit to Algeria, Cameroon, Angola, and Equatorial Guinea in Northern Africa. In Algeria, the Pope will retrace some of the steps of the 5th century Bishop of Hippo, Saint Augustine. Remember that Pope Leo is a member of the Order of Saint Augustine, a religious community of men founded in 1244.

Saint Augustine and all you holy women, men, and children, pray for Pope Leo!
