As we greet the holy month of June, here is a poem to set the stage.

Everything is Waiting for You
by David Whyte

You're great mistake is to act the drama,
as if you were alone. As if life
were a progressive and cunning crime
with no witness to the tiny hidden
transgressions. To feel abandoned is to deny
the intimacy of your surroundings. Surely,
even you, at times, have felt the grand array;
the swelling presence, and the chorus crowding out
your solo voice. You must note
the way the soap dish enables you,
or the window latch grants you freedom.
Alertness is the hidden discipline of familiarity.
The stairs are your mentor of things
to come, the doors have always been there
to frighten you and invite you,
and the tiny speaker in the phone
is your dream-ladder to divinity.

Put down the weight of your aloneness
and ease into the conversation.
The kettle is singing
even as it pours you a drink, the cooking pots
have left their arrogant aloofness and
seen the good in you at last. All the birds
and creatures of the world are unutterably
themselves. Everything is waiting for you.

I believe it was Saint Thomas Aquinas who suggested that enthroned alongside the Book of the Sacred Scriptures is the Book of Sacred Nature. Both of these holy books reveal the faithful constancy of the Lord, always in our midst and reaching out to you and me with a magnificent Love.

The practice of *lectio divina*, the divine reading of Scripture organized around the 4 R's of Reading, Reflecting, Responding, and Resting is easily transferred to our experiences in nature.

The author of the poem above is David Whyte, who has a bit of the Irish and Scots Yorkshire in his ancestry, and has a degree in marine zoology. He has done studies of nature's glory on the Galapagos Islands. In an interview with Krista Tippett on *On Being* in 2022, Mr Whyte admits,

"Yes, I went back into poetry because I felt like scientific language wasn't precise enough to describe the experiences that I had in Galapagos. Science, rightly, is always trying to remove the *I*. But I was really interested in the way that the *I* deepened, the more you paid attention. And in Galapagos, I began to realize that because I was in deeply attentive states, hour after hour, watching animals and birds and landscapes — and that's all I did for almost two years — I began to realize that my identity depended, not upon any beliefs I had, inherited beliefs or manufactured beliefs, but my identity actually depended on how much attention I was paying to things that were other than myself, and that as you deepen this intentionality and this attention, you started to broaden and deepen your own sense of presence."

"This poem [found above] is written almost like a conversation in the mirror, trying to remind myself what's first-order. And we have so many allies in this world, including just the color blue in the sky, which we're not paying attention to, or the breeze or the ground beneath our feet. And so this is an invitation to come out of abstraction and back into the world again."

The poet is on to something here. I believe that the spiritual life begins in a spirit of hyperattentiveness to all around us and within us. In the woods which is social media and the constant scrolling that accompanies it, there is a tendency to always be on the move, never slowing down, never really paying attention, and losing one's way. In fact, we can anesthetize ourselves to a degree that we are not attentive to our outer surroundings or to our interior feelings. Our friendship with the Lord is stymied if we never take the time to be impacted by the beauty of nature or of our inner life. When was the last time you *rested* in the beauty of creation or in the grace of your emotions? When was the last time you read a novel or watched a movie or listened to a piece of music which moved you to tears?

Everything is Waiting for You is charged with this spirituality of paying attention. The language is there for us:

- *the intimacy of your surroundings*
- *surely you have felt the grand array; the swelling presence*
- *Alertness is the hidden discipline of familiarity*
- *The stairs are your mentor of things to come, the doors have always been there to frighten you and invite you, and the tiny speaker in the phone is your dream-ladder to divinity*
- *The kettle is singing even as it pours you a drink, the cooking pots have left their arrogant aloofness and seen the good in you at last. All the birds and creatures of the world are unutterably themselves. Everything is waiting for you.*

Father Henri Nouwen says this about the art of waiting:

“To wait with openness and trust is an enormously radical attitude toward life. It is choosing to hope that something is happening for us that is far beyond our own imaginings. It is giving up control over our future and letting God define our life. It is living with the conviction that God molds us in love, holds us in tenderness, and moves us away from the sources of our fear.”

June is charged with the grand array and a swelling presence! School is on its summer break. The strains of Pomp and Circumstance have been shelved for another year. Our graduates are taking a breath as they gear up for all that autumn will bring. The garden is promising all good things to come. The bunnies have made their appearance. The grass is growing and the lawnmowers are purring. One of my housekeepers just reported that a woodpecker has made herself or himself a nuisance by knocking without ceasing on their house. The crack of the baseball bat and the swish of the soccer ball have made their appearance across our land. All is gearing up for the celebration of the 250th anniversary of the founding of our nation. Summer vacations are in the offing.
