





The praying of the Liturgy of the Hours remains a mystery to most Catholics. Some of our senior members may hold the image of the elderly monsignor, clad in his black cassock, on a beautiful morning, strolling around the block, where the church and rectory are situated, carrying his breviary, and praying the Divine Office. Or maybe you can imagine monks or nuns sitting in the choir stalls of a chapel, across from each other, chanting the Divine Office. So you might conclude that the Divine Office is somehow the domain of just priests, nuns, and monks.

No...No...No!

The Divine Office belongs to the whole Church as a treasure chest for daily prayer. The whole day is consecrated to the Lord as the prayer weaves itself through that day. Matins (at Midnight) begins the day, and is more commonly called the Office of Readings. The backbone of this prayer, as well as the other moments of prayer during the day, is the recitation or chanting of the Psalms.

I pray Matins every morning with the Benedictine Monks of Worth Abbey in Crawley, The United Kingdom. Dare say NOT at midnight but around 5 am! After chanting at most three designated Psalms, comes the proclamation of the Scripture. During the Season of Lent, the Book of Exodus is the continuous Scripture reading. Following a moment of silence, a second set of designated Psalms is chanted, followed by a reading from one of the Church Fathers or Mothers. After another moment of silence, the closing prayer, which usually is the opening prayer for the day's Mass, is offered.

Filling in the picture of walking the whole day with the Lord through the Divine Office, Matins is followed by Lauds (Morning Prayer), Terce (Mid-Morning Prayer), Sect (Noon Day Prayer), None (Mid Afternoon Prayer), Vespers (Evening Prayer) and Compline (Night Prayer). I pray Lauds and Vespers, as well as Matins, every day with the Monks of England.

There is a certain expertise to joining a community on-line for this prayer. Nadine, our Director of Pastoral Administration and Pastoral Care, was nice enough to compile the Psalter used at Worth Abbey, so that I can chant the psalms along with the monks. I have no idea how she was able to do this all, presenting me with two small binders that include the two-week cycle for Matins, Lauds, and Vespers. These are precious gifts!

What I would suggest if you are interested in this kind of prayer is that you check out *Sing the Hours* on YouTube. There you will find Lauds and Vespers for each day.

I am intrigued that the Book of Exodus is chosen as the continuous Scripture reading at Matins during Lent. The Passover from slavery in Egypt to freedom in the Promised Land is the defining moment in the faith (love) story between the Lord and the Hebrew People, and is still celebrated today as a perpetual memorial. Remember that a memorial is so much more than recalling something that happened a long time ago. The celebration of a memorial makes the mystery of that holy event ever present now. Remember this is true as well when we celebrate the events of Holy Week. We are celebrating more than history. We are celebrating rather the mystery of the Lord's ever present love for us!

Of course, the Passover of the Israelite People is the prototype of our Christian Passover. The Israelites were saved from the avenging angel by the mark of the lamb's blood on the doorposts of their homes. We are saved by the blood of Jesus, the Lamb of God, who died for love of us upon the Tree of the Cross.

The Israelites escaped the clutches of the Egyptians by passing through the Red Sea, with the waters piled up high like walls on both sides of them. We are saved from the slavery of sin and death through the waters of our Baptism.

All journeys in whatever faith are marked by the movement from orientation, through disorientation, to reorientation. Transformation or change is always like this. The familiar gives way to a time of upset which eventually settles into something new.

It is interesting to note that the Israelites got a bit testy through their time of disorientation, wandering in the desert. They begged that the Lord let them go back to Egypt!

Oh, how change is sometimes so difficult! The key is to hang on to the Lord, trusting always that something new can come about through all of the preceding turmoil.

This movement from orientation, through disorientation, to reorientation just might be one of the keys to experiencing the holy season of Lent in our lives. What works of transformation is Jesus doing in your life this Lent? Where in your life this Lent is there an inkling of disorientation?

LORD JESUS, change our hearts this time!
