

GOSPEL MEDITATION

Recently I watched a bunch of YouTube videos on how to optimize willpower in the face of weakness. The message was: do not accept your weakness. Crush it. Dominate it. In one video, however, at the end of a rant by a willpower coach, the muscular stoic admitted, "You'll never actually get what you want, no matter how hard you try." Amazingly, he admitted that willpower alone is not sufficient for us weak-willed humans.

What does God want us to do with our weaknesses, if crushing them with willpower won't work? For example, what should I do with my tendency to arrogance and self-isolation? Or my procrastination? Or my intellectual and physical limitations? Or my selfishness?

The counter-intuitive answer is clear in this week's words from St Paul, "I will rather boast most gladly of my weaknesses in order that the power of Christ may dwell in me (2 Cor. 12:9)." Boast of our weaknesses? Paul isn't promoting weakmindedness or laziness. Rather, he perceives that Jesus loves us not despite our weaknesses but because of them. Boasting of our weakness means claiming human will is not all we have. It means turning to God whenever we feel weak, which-let's face it-is almost all the time. When we do, we learn to love our weaknesses, because it's there that we meet the strength of Christ. This week, I challenge us to find ways to boast not in willpower but in weakness.

Updated Stipend and Stole Fee Structure -

Effective July 1, 2024

The Diocese of Green Bay and our parishes are grateful to all those who have generously provided a donation for Masses, funerals, weddings and Quinceaneras in the past. The donation for these sacraments and services has remained the same for over thirty years throughout the Dioceses of Wisconsin. Recently, when the Bishops of the State of Wisconsin gathered, they decreed that stipends should be adjusted to reflect the current time. The new stipend structure is as follows:

- Mass Stipend \$20
- Funeral Stole Fee \$75
- Wedding & Quinceanera Stole Fee \$100

This new fee structure will become effective July 1, 2024. It will not be applied retroactively to those who have already paid the appropriate amount from the former fee scale. The new fee structure will be applied to all new requests received as of July 1, 2024.

As always, if someone is not able to offer the stipend, the parish is always happy to provide the sacrament or service with no fee. Please know, too, that any stipend money collected goes to the parish in support of its ministry and services provided to the parish community; it does not go personally to the priest.

Perchance, do you know the origin of the name of the seventh month of the year? I have to confess that I had forgotten this.

July is a Middle English word taken from the Latin *Julius*. *July* then is named after (You guessed it!) Julius Caesar. Quintilis, which was his birth month, was renamed July when he died. Quintilis means "fifth month" in Latin, which represents where this month originally fell in the Roman calendar.

Look for the full moon on Sunday, July 21, named by our Native American sisters and brothers as the Thunder Moon, due to the frequent thunderstorms during the month, or the Buck Moon, due to the new velvety antlers appearing on male deer at this time of the year.

The birth flowers for July are the water lily, sweet pea, and the delphinium.

Let me look to Bishop Robert Morneau's <u>There is a Season: An Inspirational Journal</u> to set the stage for a worthy greeting to the month of July.

IT IS IN JULY that the corn is knee high, right to the eye, that swimming holes are revisited by young and old, that a liberty bell is cracked for freedom, that air conditioners do their thing, that all stars begin to shine [think baseball, too] that a cold rain is welcomed like a victorious general, that gardens are invited in for dinner, that snow joins the extinct species, that wadis* lose their sense of identity, and that the sun reaches a midlife crisis.

IT WAS IN JULY that certain lessons and insights came home: that our freedom is required only through the pain of bruises and scars, that sanity is fostered through keeping one's hands close to the soil, that inner time must be carefully respected if growth is to follow, that prayer is the gateway to peace, that heaven is being with, and that desires carefully tended motivate the development of unique gifts.

How about a poem for July! (Hopefully you clapped rather than groaned!)

Here is Mary Oliver's <u>When I Am Among the Trees</u>. Mary Oliver is one of my favorite poets.

When I am among the trees, especially the willows and the honey locust, equally the beech, the oaks and the pines, they give off such hints of gladness. I would almost say that they save me, and daily.

I am so distant from the hope of myself, in which I have goodness, and discernment, and never hurry through the world but walk slowly, and bow often.

Around me the trees stir in their leaves and call out, "Stay awhile." The light flows from their branches.

And they call again, "It's simple," they say, "and you too have come into the world to do this, to go easy, to be filled with light, and to shine."

Finally, as the Church dedicates the month of July to the Precious Blood of Jesus, I offer this Litany.

[The response to the following invocations is: **Be our salvation**]

Blood of Christ, only Son of the Father, Response. Blood of Christ, incarnate Word, R. Blood of Christ, of the new and eternal covenant, R. Blood of Christ, that spilled to the ground, R. Blood of Christ, that flowed at the scourging, R. Blood of Christ, dripping from the thorns, R. Blood of Christ, shed on the cross, R. Blood of Christ, the price of our redemption, R. Blood of Christ, our only claim to pardon, R. Blood of Christ, our blessing cup, R. Blood of Christ, in which we are washed, R. Blood of Christ, torrent of mercy, R. Blood of Christ, that overcomes evil, R. Blood of Christ, strength of the martyrs, R. Blood of Christ, endurance of the saints, R. Blood of Christ, that makes the barren fruitful, R. Blood of Christ, protection of the threatened, R. Blood of Christ, comfort of the weary, R. Blood of Christ, solace of the mourner, R. Blood of Christ, hope of the repentant, R. Blood of Christ, consolation of the dying, R. Blood of Christ, our peace and refreshment, R, Blood of Christ, our pledge of life, R. Blood of Christ, by which we pass to glory, R, Blood of Christ, most worthy of honor, R.

Let us pray: Father, by the blood of your Son you have set us free and saved us from death. Continue the work of your love within us, that by constantly celebrating the mystery of our salvation, we may reach the eternal life it promises. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.
