O1.12.2025 ST. MARY PARISH-APPLETON WITH FR. BILL SWICHTENBERG

In this Jubilee Year in the Universal Catholic Church and in our Spiritual Family of Saint Mary Parish, as we mark the 165th Anniversary of our Founding, we are a people on the lookout for signs of hope in this holy time of 2025!

There is always reason to have hope. We hold on tightly to the rope of the anchor, which is hope, always tethered closely to the Lord and to one another. Our Christian faith is tethered to the Holy Cross of Jesus. Nothing can stop His Love from being victorious. This hope never disappoints.

I am happy to announce two gifts of hope that Pope Francis gave the Church on the Traditional Feast of the Epiphany, Monday, January 6. (Not frankincense and myrrh!) Let me share these two announcements from the Holy See.

(I) The Holy Father has appointed the Reverend Sister Simona Brambilla, M.C., until now Secretary of the Dicastery for the Institutes of Consecrated Life and the Societies of Apostolic Life as Prefect of the same Curial Institution.

This is the first time in the history of the Catholic Church that a woman has been given the responsibility of heading up an Office of the Roman Curia. Interestingly, working closely with her in a subordinate position in the Dicastery will be a Cardinal. My friends, this is a huge step forward in affirming the dignity and gifts of women and placing them at the highest levels of decision-making and decision-taking in the Catholic Church. Notice the use of "Reverend" as a prefix in front of Sister's name!

(II) The Holy Father has appointed Cardinal Robert Walter McElroy as metropolitan archbishop of Washington, United States of America, transferring him from the diocese of San Diego, California, United States of America.

Pope Francis has given the Church an incredible gift in appointing this humble shepherd to our nation's capital. Cardinal McElroy has been on my radar for a number of years. His ministry in San Diego has been so beautiful as he is a servant leader who has the smell of God's sheep upon him. He has been an outspoken advocate for our immigrant sisters and brothers, so many of them at the border between San Diego and Mexico, affirming again and again their sacred dignity. Ditto the Cardinal's strong advocacy for the Church to be a place of welcome and affirmation of our sisters and brothers in the LGBTQ+ community.

Introduced on Monday to the People of God in Washington, DC, Cardinal McElroy spoke beautifully about Pope Francis' dream for a synodal Church. He was one of the delegates in both sessions of the XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops: For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, Mission, meeting in October of 2023 and 2024.

The Cardinal is a brilliant intellect in the American Church. He has a doctorate in political science from Stanford and a doctorate in moral theology. He is well known for his compassionate and tender style.

David Gibson, director of Fordham University's Center on Religion and Culture, highlighted some of the political implications of the appointment.

The appointment is about promoting solidarity over division, and building what Francis has called 'a better kind of politics' rather than indulging in the worst kind of partisanship. McElroy has been one of the American church's most articulate voices for unity rather than culture warring, grace over grievance. He is the rare bishop in the U.S. hierarchy who, on a practical level, possesses both the heart and mind that can give voice to a truly Catholic and 'catholic' vision. That vision...will serve as a model for Catholics in the public square and at the ballot box." (From National Catholic Reporter, Jan 7)

Cardinal McElroy wrote this letter to the priests of the Diocese of San Diego on Monday, Jan 6:

"Today Pope Francis announced my appointment as archbishop of Washington. It is a wonderful Diocese with splendid priests and lay leaders, vibrant in faith and compassionate in heart.

Yet still I feel great sadness in leaving the diocese of San Diego, where a large part of my heart will continue to be. And a great deal of that sadness arises from the wonderful presence that the priests of San Diego have been in my heart and in my ministry during these past ten years. The strength of your commitment to God and the service of His people on every level has been the foundation for carrying out the work of the Lord during my tenure. And your kindness to me when I had to do difficult things or got it wrong has been immensely consoling. Ours is an exemplary presbyterate, and I hope that you all know that with as much certainty as I do."

For many reasons (the bold highlights are mine), this letter is so beautiful. As a priest, I feel affirmation for my own ministry, coming as it does all the way from San Diego.

Finally, let me share with you a portion of Pope Francis' Letter to the twenty-one newest Cardinals in our Church, which he wrote on October 6 of last year. The 21 Cardinals received their rings and red birettas from Pope Francis on Saturday, Dec 7, the day before the celebration of the reopening of Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris.

I know the Pope's sentiments would resonate with the new eighth Archbishop of Washington, as well as with Archbishop Wilton Cardinal Gregory, who, after such a beautiful witness in our nation's capital since 2019, enters into a well-deserved time of retirement. The US Church is deeply grateful to Cardinal Gregory for his holy ministry. He played a crucial role as President of the US Conference of Catholic Bishops during the explosion of the clergy sex abuse scandal in 2000 and in adopting the Dallas Charter to Protect God's Children.

Here's Pope Francis:

I urge you to make every effort as a Cardinal to embody the three attitudes with which an Argentinian poet (Francisco Luis Bernárdez) once characterized Saint John of the Cross, and which are also applicable to us: "eyes raised, hands joined, feet bare.""

Eyes raised, because your service will require you to lengthen your gaze and broaden your heart, in order to see farther and to love more expansively and with greater fervour. To sit with John of the Cross "at the school of his gaze" (Pope Benedict XVI), which is the pierced side of Christ.

Hands joined, because what the Church most needs – together with the preaching of the Gospel – is your prayer to be able to shepherd well the flock of Christ. Prayer is the realm of discernment that helps me to seek and discover God's will for our people, and to follow it.

Feet bare, because they touch the harsh realities of all those parts of the world overwhelmed by the pain and suffering due to war, discrimination, persecution, hunger and many forms of poverty; these will demand from you great compassion and mercy.

I thank you for your generosity and I assure you of my prayers that the title of "Servant" ("deacon") will increasingly eclipse that of "Eminence".

May the Holy Spirit spread Her Gentle Wings of Wisdom, Courage, and Humility over Sister Brambilla and Cardinal McElroy!

Hope never disappoints!
