



I WANTED TO SHARE WITH YOU THE HOMILY I GAVE FOR THE ECUMENICAL PRAYER SERVICE DURING THE 58TH WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY.

I offered the following reflection on Thursday,
January 23, in our Church. I am grateful to my fellow
Christian ministers who participated in this Prayer
Service. They were Pastor
Mary Bauer, First English
Lutheran Church, Pastor
Marcus Wegenast, First United

Methodist Church, Pastor Tim Moffett, Valley Baptist Church, and Pastor Shawn Whitworth, The Mission Church.

Here's what you can expect from this homily tonight: a joke, two images and some encouragement. So, if I can stay on track, you will know when I will be sitting down!

Three women die and go to heaven. Saint Peter meets them at the pearly gates. Peter says to the first woman,

"Welcome to heaven! Back on earth, what denomination were you?" She replies, "I was a devout Presbyterian." St Peter, "Excellent! Go to door 10, but when you pass door 2, be very quiet." Peter asks the second woman, "When you were on earth, what denomination were vou?" The second woman replies, "I was the pastor of my Methodist Church!" Peter says, "Wonderful! Make your way to door 6, but when you pass door 2, be very quiet." Peter asks the last woman, "What denomination were you on earth?" The woman says, "I was Lutheran." Peter says, "You know the drill. Go to door 12, but be very quiet when you go past door 2." She says, "Why is it we need to be so quiet when we go past door 2?" Saint Peter replies, "Because that's where the Catholics are and they think they're the only ones here."

You may have laughed but I can tell you that no Catholic Christian in the Middle Ages would have laughed but

they would have rather applauded. Thank God we are no longer living in the Middle Ages!

I bet most of us are familiar with the Prophet Ezekiel's vision of the dry bones, making a ruckus, and coming together in the desert.

But Ezekiel had another vision that few us are familiar with.

As the People of Israel were so divided, the Kingdoms of the North, ten tribes strong, and the Kingdoms of the South, only two tribes, Ezekiel was directed by the Lord God to obtain two sticks, to write the names of the ten tribes on one stick, and the names of the two tribes on the other, and to bind those two sticks together.

God's promise to God's Chosen People was that God would be the agent who restored holy unity among them. Obviously, two sticks joined together are far stronger than a single stick!

When Pope Francis visited
Jakarta, Indonesia, last
September, he highlighted for
the world to know that there is
a *Tunnel of Friendship* that
runs underground, connecting
the Catholic Cathedral to the
Moslem Mosque.

In Pope Francis' greeting in that holy space, he suggested that "we who belong to different religious traditions have a role to play in helping everyone pass through the tunnels of life with our eyes turned towards the light. Then, at the end of the journey, we will be able to recognize in those who have walked beside us, a brother, a sister, with whom we can share life and support each other."

In the face of today's many challenges, we respond with the sign of fraternity (sorority). Indeed, by welcoming others and respecting their identity, fraternity urges them on a common path travelled in friendship and leading towards the light." (Pope Francis' Greeting in the Tunnel of Friendship, Jakarta, Indonesia, Sept 5, 2024)

Two Sticks Joined Together as a Single Stick

The whole is always greater than its individual parts. The Christian Church, the People of God, is always greater than its individual denominations. Unity does not mean conformity and diversity is always to be celebrated.

In the Vatican II Decree on Ecumenism, the Council Fathers wrote of the beauty of dialogue between different Christian communities in which "everyone gains a truer knowledge and more just appreciation of the teaching and religious life of both

"When such actions are undertaken prudently and patiently... They promote justice and truth, concord and collaboration, as well as the spirit of brotherly (sisterly) love and unity. This is the way that, when the obstacles to perfect ecclesiastical communion have been gradually overcome, all Christians will at last, in a common celebration of the Eucharist, be gathered into the one and only Church in that unity which Christ bestowed on His Church from the beginning." (paragraph 4)

The Tunnel of Friendship

Here in the city of Appleton, we have a group of fellow Christians that have named themselves "Churches United in Care." Of late, they have been meeting regularly with a critical need on their hearts having to do with providing affordable housing for those without homes, and providing adequate shelter for those who are homeless.

United in a love for the Lord and in a desire to make a difference in the lives of our sisters and brothers who are struggling, they are embodying Jesus Himself alive and present in our community.

The pastoral style of Jesus must be our style. That style is to be close to people, to be tender and compassionate.

We Christians must be convinced that closeness, tenderness, and compassion are constitutive of the Gospel of Jesus. We put Jesus and His Gospel in first place. Jesus and His Gospel must shape our viewpoints and our politics.

As disciples of Jesus, we are courageous in calling out those people who shape Jesus and His Gospel according to their personal perspectives.

To be silent in the face of this reinterpretation of the Gospel is to become complicit in a lie.

Let me finish with these words

of the late Congressman John
Lewis, who, as a little boy
believed that he would one
day be a preacher of the
Gospel and who would
practice by preaching to the
animals on his boyhood farm
in Troy, Alabama:
"When you see something that
is not right, you must say
something. You must do
something...each generation
must do its part to help build

what we called the Beloved Community, a nation and world society at peace with itself."

Together, let us be that Beloved Community in Appleton and far beyond!
