
LENTEN ALMS PROJECT



We provide water, wine, grape juice, milk, place settings, and unleavened bread.



IT SHOULD COME AS NO SURPRISE THAT I AM A VORACIOUS READER OF ALL THINGS THAT ARE CATHOLIC.

Included in that long list of books and monthly and weekly journals is <u>The National Catholic Reporter</u>. This is a publication that is focussed on the ministry of Pope Francis and his dream for a Synodal Church, always grounded in the teachings of Vatican Council II, with contributions from theologians who are provocative and forward thinking. The <u>NCR</u> should not be confused with the <u>National Catholic Register</u>, which, in my humble opinion, sometimes presents a narrow view on what it means to be Catholic. I believe the <u>Register</u> is affiliated with the <u>Eternal World Television Network (EWTN)</u>, of which I am not a big fan. EWTN's disrespect for Pope Francis appalls me.

I have always paid close attention to the contributions of Daniel Horan to the NCR. I find his study to be prophetic, courageous and in keeping with the spirit of synodality which Pope Francis has I find his study to be prophetic, courageous and in keeping with the spirit of synodality which Pope Francis has dclared constitutive of what it means to be Church.

Last fall, after a hard period of prayerful discernment, Fr Dan decided to leave the Order of Friars Minor. He announced his decision on the Feast of the Transitus of Saint Francis of Assisi, October 4. The *Transitus* refers to St Francis' passing from this life to eternal life. For the friend of Jesus, death is not the enemy nor does it end our lives. Death is a birth into eternal life.

In a sense, not just at the end of our lives but throughout our lives, there are moments of transitus. I am filled with hope when I encounter in my own life and in the lives of others a willingness to be open to something new. To change one's mind and heart is a beautiful thing. To encourage a new perspective that is contributed by someone else, not something that you or I thought of, is a beautiful thing.

The <u>NCR</u> stretches me to consider new ideas and perspectives. I find Mr Horan's contributions stimulating.

Recently I learned the storyline of the 1959 play "Rhinoceros" by the Romanian-French writer Eugene Ionesco. The setting is a small town where the protagonist named Berenger, while talking with his friend, Jean, in a cafe, witnesses a rhinoceros running through the street. At first, Jean tries to convince Berenger that he is imagining things or daydreaming, but over the course of the three-act play more and more people in the town turn into rhinoceroses. Eventually Berenger's initially dismissive and

skeptical friend, Jean, also turns into one, as does his love interest, Daisy.

Let me quote from Dan Horan here (NCR, 3.6.25):

Ionesco's creative framing highlights the dangers of mass mentality, group thinking, and social pressures to conform and the chaos that can ensue as a result.

It's not just fear that leads many of the humans to turn into rhinoceroses. Instead, there is a shift in desire, a cultural repositioning and social construction that results in many actually wanting to become a rhinoceros in the end. They long to be part of the crowd and, fairly quickly, collectively move from fearing the dangerous beasts to hoping to become one of them.

Throughout the play, Berenger resists the transformation and struggles to hold onto his humanity in the face of pressure from his friends and neighbors who embrace their new animalistic identities. In the last scene of the play, when it appears that every other human has transformed into a rhinoceros, Berenger offers a soliloquy in which he momentarily thinks that perhaps he made a mistake, that maybe he, too, should have given in and joined the mass movement by becoming a rhinoceros.

But in the last lines of the play, he appears to snap out of that brief self-doubt to proclaim: "People who try to hang on to their individuality always come to a bad end! Oh well, too bad! I'll take on the whole of them! I'll put up a fight against the lot of them, the whole lot of them! I'm the last man left, and I'm staying that way until the end. I'm not capitulating!"

Ionesco's play has long been interpreted as a cautionary tale about the conformity that leads to totalitarianism and the ease with which people, often ordinary people of goodwill, can be swept into dangerous ideologies.

Being an expert on all things having to do with the Trappist monk, Father Thomas Merton, Mr Horan refers to Fr Merton's essay in 1965 titled "Rain and the Rhinoceros."

[Merton] believed there is a moral imperative that Christians have to resist the dehumanizing ideologies that result from the kind of collective thinking represented by Ionesco's rhinoceros.

Merton explains that this kind of dangerous collectivity "needs not only to absorb everyone it can, but also [needs] implicitly to hate and destroy whoever cannot be absorbed.

Paradoxically, one of the needs of collectivity is to reject certain classes, or races, or groups, in order to strengthen its own self-awareness by hating them instead of absorbing them."

Merton understood the challenge to maintain one's individuality and freedom, which he associated with one's "true self." The condition of the possibility of becoming part of the dangerous herd is the surrender of who we really are in order to put on a "false self."

Merton's spiritual wisdom and Ionesco's social criticism provide us with a warning about the dangers of joining the herd mentality and giving up one's individuality, distinctive perspective and moral compass.

As Ionesco's character Berenger notes, it is not easy to resist collective thinking, particularly

when you are convinced that it is the only way to succeed, be re-elected or obtain power or influence. However, those tempted to forgo their humanity to become a rhinoceros ought to reflect on the spiritual costs, too. For, as Jesus himself once asked, "What good would it be for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul?" (Matthew 16:26).

I am reminded of the prophetic wisdom from the long-serving and long-suffering Congressman of Georgia, Representative John Lewis:

- "When you see something that is not right, not just, not fair, you have a moral obligation to say something. To do something."
- "We have been too quiet for too long. There comes a time when you have to say something. You have to make a little noise.
 You have to move your feet. This is the time."
- "We cannot thrive as a democracy when justice is reserved for only those with means."

I offer the above reflections for your thought and prayer as we move through these chaotic and troubling days in our nation and world.
